FB-ISAO has assessed the general Physical Threat Level for US Faith-Based Organizations as **"SEVERE."** As per FB-ISAO's definitions of the Physical Threat Levels, **"SEVERE"** means that an event is highly likely.

Please note that the Pandemic Threat Level has been lowered to Guarded.

FB-ISAO Cyber Threat Level: Guarded

FB-ISAO has assessed the general Cyber Threat Level for US Faith-Based Organizations as **"GUARDED."** As per FB-ISAO's definitions of the Cyber Threat Levels, **"GUARDED"** means FB-ISAO is unaware of any specific events, but a general risk of incidents exists.

What Role do Bystanders Play?

Many Faith-Based Organizations (FBOs) rely on a small staff or volunteers to fulfill security functions, while others may have limited funds available for expanded security. However, focusing only on those who work with, or for, the FBO ignores another potential line of defense - the regular congregation member, the visitor, or the bystander. The congregation may be in a position to identify suspicious activities or anomalous acts. **BYSTANDERS** are individuals whose relationships and levels of interaction with a person enable them to become aware of activities or behaviors that indicate that an individual is on a path to violence. The FBI and the National Counter-terrorism Center (NCTC) published a Joint pamphlet titled Understanding Bystander Interventions to Prevent Terrorism. The pamphlet is <u>available</u> here. Bystanders can be represented in one of four distinct groups:

- Family Members (41%), including parents, stepparents, spouses, siblings, cousins, and children.
- **Peers** (39%), such as coworkers, students, close friends, and significant others.
- Community Authority Figures (15%), such as religious leaders, teachers, and work supervisors.
- **Strangers** (5%). Although strangers were the smallest bystander group, they were the most likely to report concerning behaviors to law enforcement.

Did You Know?

Bystanders observed an average of <u>four to five</u> concerning behaviors by active shooters <u>before</u> shooting incidents. In 56% of active shooter incidents in the U.S., the attackers leaked their intent to commit violence to one or more third-party bystanders through verbal or written communications or online interactions.
